Decorated by France.

FREDERICKSBURG, May 10.—Major S. R. Dishman, formerly of King George County, has received the decoration of the cross of the Legion of Honor of France, conferred on him by Marshal Petain. Mrs. S. R. Dishman, now in Spokane, Wash., received a cablegram from her husband, Major Dishman, informing her of the honor that had been conferred upon him by the famous French marshal. Major Dishman has been in France for nearly two years, being the first American quartermaster to land on French soil. He enlisted over two years ago, and was sent to Presidio. He was there only a short time when he was commissioned as a captain in the quartermaster's department and sent to France with the first American troops who were sent over following the declaration of war. Major Dishman saw former service in the United States Army some twelve years ago. He is a native of King George County, and is a brother of Mrs. Hezekiah Potts, of that county.
